

Plank-shaped Idol Cypriot, Middle Cypriot I, ca. 1900-1800 B.C.

The present figurine is a very fine example of a plank-shaped figurine from Early Bronze Age Cyprus. The figurine has a rectangular head and body, the head featuring a raised nose and two round impressions indicating eyes. Both the head and body are lavishly decorated with geometric incised patterns on both sides: above the eyes perhaps indicating a headdress, along the neck, and down the body, likely indicating a woven garment overlaid with jewelry. The reverse of the head is decorated with cascading rows of incised lines, perhaps indicating long hair.

Anatomical representations of humans and animals first appear in the Neolithic period on Cyprus, at the end of the ninth millennium B.C. Not until the third-millennium B.C., however, did stone and terracotta figurines come into use in large quantities in religious rituals. Although the sex of the present figurine is not clear from its iconography, Bronze Age Cypriot human figures were dominated by representations of women, which are supposed to have represented fertility and rebirth in the afterlife.

The present figurine is exceptional in its large size, as well as its impeccable state of preservation. The figure is entirely original and unrepaired, as attested by a scientific report conducted by the Qed Laboratoire (Marseille).
