Selected Reading List

Though Weber is acknowledged as a leader in the stylistic and technical development of Modernism and a key figure in the translation of European abstraction to American audiences, his contributions have rarely been comprehensively examined by scholars. Rather, his life and work have generally been considered in relation to other prominent artists, such as Alfred Stieglitz, Marsden Hartley, or Henri Matisse. Given recent publications, however, there seems to be renewed interest in Weber's unique relationship to Cubism and a move to address his oeuvre in its own right. The following compilation of scholarship consists of such works, publications by Weber himself, gallery exhibition catalogues, as well as books and articles that position Weber within the avant-garde more broadly.

Agee, William C., and Pamela N. Koob, eds. *Max Weber & American Cubism*. New York: Rizzoli Electa, 2023.

- This recent publication seeks to resituate Weber's influence on the American iteration of Cubism, particularly within the New York avant-garde. More broadly, the book argues for Weber's place in bringing American Cubism to global prominence and, in turn, the ascendancy of the United States's cultural output mid-century.
- Includes a thorough representation of Weber's oeuvre in illustrations

Ireson, Nancy, Lionel Kelly, Sarah MacDougall, Percy North, Pamela G. Roberts, and Anna Gruetzner Robins. *Max Weber: An American Cubist in Paris and London, 1905–15*. Lund Humphries, 2014.

This book includes a series of illustrated essays that explore
Weber's connections to Matisse, Picasso, and Henri Rousseau,
showing how the French artists' influence on him was also
transmitted to British artists outside of France.

North, Percy, Max Weber: The Early Paintings, 1905–1920, Ph.D. dissertation, University of Delaware, 1975.

 This is a dissertation on Weber by one of the foremost experts on his life and work. Focusing on his early artistic output, this dissertation examines the influences that shaped his approach to Modernism, including his little-studied relationship to Japanese print culture and immigrant groups in New York.

Rubenstein, D.R. Max Weber: A Catalogue Raisonné of his Graphic Work. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1980.

 This book includes 132 images pertaining to Weber's oeuvre. A revised edition was published in 2013 with an additional 82 colored images.

- Includes 160 illustrations, with 54 color plates.
- Extensive text on Weber's life and work, along with a comprehensive bibliography.
